## What a winter

For years, Texas had experienced moderate winters and extreme summer temperatures that had resulted in droughts and wildfires across the western part of the state. The winter of 2017, however, saw the return of La Niña--a climate pattern which sees the cooling of the Equatorial Pacific by as much as 5 degrees celsius. The result was a winter with lower temperatures and greater precipitation. Snowfall in East Texas is a rare occurance, particularly in regions close to the Gulf of Mexico. Due to its infrequency, minor snowfall often

results in closed schools. Coming to school and finding so much snow on the ground was a unique experience for students.

## #ISTANDWITH DREEAMERS

On Monday, March 5th. 2018, students arganized a campus walkout in support of Oreamers. The protest was scheduled for the same day as the expiration of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals order signed by President Barack Obamain 2012. Donald Trump, who had campaigned on a promise to hatt illegal immigration to the United States, rescinded the order. After promising to make a deal with both Democrats and Republicans, he refused the bipartisan legislation and claimed on Twitter that he would no longer support a deal. 98% of students at YES Prep North Central are Hispanic, and many of those students are either protected by DACA or have parents who are undocumented. Failure to pass an immigration deal to protect Dreamers could have a profound impact on our student body.















Many of the students who organized the DACA walkout have become seasoned activists. Some have traveled to Washington D.C. to protest and have also participated in Houston.









The Class of 2018 engaged much of North Central in what has become a new era of activism demonstrated through empowerment conferences, student organizations, and walkouts in support of DACA recipients and gun control.









## is worth a thousand words




